



The Dreamers by Karen Thompson Walker


The Water Dancer by Ta-Nehisi Coates


The World That We Knew by Alice Hoffman


There, There by Tommy Orange




After the Flood by Kassandra Montag

A young woman becomes an overnight celebrity before realizing she's part of something bigger, and stranger, than anyone could have possibly imagined.




I'll Be Gone in the Dark by Michelle McNamara


Spinning Silver by Naomi Novik

To protect what she loves most, Circe must summon all her strength and choose, once and for all, whether she belongs with the gods she is born from, or the mortals she has come to love.




Imaginary Friend by Stephen Chbosky


The Book of Essie by Meghan Maclean Weir
