


Anger is a Gift by Mark Oshiro



People Kill People by Ellen **Hopkins**



Told in two distinct and irresistible voices, this is the story of two black girls from very different backgrounds finding love and happiness in a world that seems determined to deny them both.


Cracking the Bell by Geoff Herbach




Black Enough: Stories of Being Young & Black in America edited by Ibi Zoboi






Let Me Hear a Rhyme by Tiffany Jackson
